Geena Davis wants parity for women

Academy Award and Golden Globe-winning Geena Davis ignited the 2,200 women at the Women's Foundation Luncheon last week with an energy born of her depth and fire, discussing her TV and movie career while noting she isn't an actress, she's an actor.

Her burning desire is to get women in this country to wage parity and improve the way women are represented in the acting field. We don't call a female doctor a doctoress, so why call a woman who acts an actress, she asked.

A member of Mensa, the rather tall Davis was also a past semifinalist for an Olympic team, but her passion for parity is what foundation staff led them to select Davis as a keynote speaker. She verbalized statistics many in the audience were already hot about. Davis noted that the U.S. is 90° in congressional representation

male/female balance and women actors are often sexualized. The exception: Commander in Chief, the show where she played the president of the United States.

"If we continue at the present rate of growth, we'll have parity in 500 years. I want to raise that to 250 years," she said.

Of course that drew chuckles and smiles and Davis had the audience in the palm of her hand as she further went on to say that there is gender inequality all around the world and "the time for change is now."
