WFCO and the Embrey Family Foundation Put Money to Work for Girls

\$750,000 TO AID IN SCHOOL DROP OUT ISSUE



The Women's Foundation of Colorado is the proud recipient of an Embrey Family Foundation (Dallas, TX) investment. As part of a three-year, \$750,000 grant, seven organizations were selected through a request for proposals process. Our partners will receive funds to be used to help Colorado's at-risk girls graduate from high school through mentoring and sport programs.

FUNDING TO SUPPORT MENTORING AND SPORTS PROGRAMS

As part of the Girls Drop Out Prevention Project, this grant allows WFCO to scaleup statewide investments in preventing girls from dropping out of school. Supporting organizations that provide positive reinforcement through mentoring and afterschool sports programs is a significant part of ensuring the success and self-sufficiency of women and girls well into their future. Research clearly shows that participating in a solid mentoring program significantly increases academic performance for at-risk girls. In addition, middle school girls who play sports are more likely to receive better grades, higher standardized test scores and are more likely to graduate than girls who do not play sports. WFCO will invest grant funds into organizations that use these strategies with at-risk, middle school girls throughout Colorado.

OMNI Institute has been contracted to evaluate the success of the mentoring and sport programs through a variety of outcome measurement tools and technical assistance to our partners in the field. An annual meeting will be held to connect our partners, share lessons learned and research new innovations in working with at-risk girls and their ability to graduate from school.

"We are excited to partner with The Embrey Family Foundation," said Louise Atkinson, President and CEO of WFCO. "This significant investment in our work will help us carry The Women's Foundation

of Colorado's mission statewide and fund research-based strategies to help keep Colorado girls in school. The fact that 5,899 Colorado girls dropped out of school last year is concerning to us, and we will use this generous funding to make a long-term impact in the lives of at-risk girls across the state."

Conservative estimates indicate that the lost earning potential due to students not graduating from high school is \$3.4 billion per year.

WFCO's Investment Success

ENDOWMENT CROSSES \$17 MILLION MARK

The Women's Foundation of Colorado is excited to announce that the endowment crossed the \$17 million mark for the first time in 2010, and the Investment Committee is very proud to report that The Foundation has weathered the 2008-2010 economic crisis in excellent shape.

Last year the endowment was up 13.5% even with 40% invested in fixed income investments. In short, the endowment had terrific returns with significantly less risk than the S & P 500. Since June 30, 2008 the endowment is up 1.2% versus a negative 1.2% for our benchmark.

In November, the Investment Committee decided to hedge against rising interest rates by reducing the fixed income position in the portfolio from 40% to 25%, and reinvested the remaining 15% into liquid alternative investments to hedge against a correction in the equity markets. Currently the portfolio is diversified with 6 asset classes with 17 different investment managers.

Our asset consultant, Syntrinsic Investment Counsel, has skillfully guided The Women's Foundation of Colorado throughout the past three years with excellent asset allocation recommendations and investment advice.
